
Kit Carson

Authentic Symbol of the American West

Inshrined in popular mythology even in his own lifetime, Christopher Houston "Kit" Carson was a trapper, scout, Indian agent, soldier and authentic legend of the West.

Born on Christmas Eve in 1809, Carson spent most of his early childhood in Boone's Lick, Missouri. His father died when he was only nine years old, and the need to work prevented Kit from ever receiving an education. He was apprenticed to a saddlemaker in the settlement of Franklin, Missouri. Franklin was situated at the eastern end of the Santa Fe Trail, which had opened two years earlier. Many of the clientele at the saddleshop were trappers and traders, from whom Kit heard stirring tales of the Far West. Carson is reported to have found work in the saddle shop suffocating: he once stated "the business did not suit me, and I concluded to leave."

At sixteen, Carson signed on with a large



merchant caravan heading to Santa Fe. His job was to tend the horses, mules, and oxen. During the winter of 18261827 he stayed with Matthew Kinkead, a trapper and explorer, in Taos, New Mexico, then known as the capital of the fur trade in the Southwest. Kinkead had been a friend of Carson's father in Missouri, and he taught Carson the skills of a trapper.

Carson also began learning the necessary languages. Eventually he became fluent in Spanish, Navajo, Apache, Cheyenne, Arapaho, Paiute, Shoshone, and Ute.

After gaining experience along the Santa Fe Trail and in Mexico, Carson signed on with a trapping party of forty men, led by Ewing Young in the spring of 1829. This was Carson's first official expedition as a trapper. The journey took the band into unexplored Apache country along the Gila River. Ewing's group was approached and attacked by Apache natives. It was during this encounter that Carson shot and killed one of the attacking Apache, the first time he killed a man.

At the age of 25, in the summer of 1835, Carson attended an annual mountain man rendezvous, which was held along the Green River in southwestern Wyoming. He became interested in an Arapaho woman whose tribe was camped nearby the rendezvous. Her name was *Waa-Nibe*, approximated in English as "Singing Grass." Singing Grass is said to have

The History of Arizona Florence & The Silver King Mine

he prosperity of Florence dates from the discovery and working of the Silver King mine. The following account of its discovery is condensed from "Elliott's History of Arizona."

In 1870, when a party of soldiers were building a road up the Pinal Mountains under orders from General Stoneman, one of the soldiers named Sullivan, employed in cutting the trail, when returning from his work one evening. sat down to rest on a projecting rock, near the camp, and began picking up loose fragments of rock about him, amongst which there were some small but heavy black, metallic-looking lumps. These, In the early part of the 1900s writer/historian Thomas Edwin Farish was commissioned by the Arizona Territorial Legislature to write a history of Arizona. This was a mammoth undertaking in its day and took several years to complete. The original volumes of the book were published in 1915-1918.

The *Territorial News* is publishing excerpts of these volumes over the next several issues. This is an extensive work and, unfortunately, we are not able to publish the complete text on these pages. Every attempt is made to do justice to the author and preserve the integrity of his work in the selections we publish.

instead of breaking up when pounded on the stones, became flattened out, and were evidently metallic, somewhat resembling lead. This attracted his attention, but he did not fully realize the importance of his find. He, however, gathered a few of the lumps and went on to camp without saying anything about his discovery to his comrades; his term of service expired soon afterwards; he was discharged

from the service and made his way to the ranch of Charles G. Mason, located on the Gila River.


Mr. Mason was one of the very few frontiersmen who braved the terrors of the Apache and staked out a farm on the fertile bottom lands of the river. Sullivan remained at the place some time, and frequently showed the black ore,

The Arizona Trail

Pueblo Indians living in New Mexico villages called the Navajos "Cultivators of the Fields" because they were farmers long before the Spanish appeared in the 1500s. They grew corn, beans, squash and melons. The Navajos learned sheep and horse ranching from the Spanish and grazed their livestock in New Mexico and Arizona.

In 1875, when Arizona was a federal territory and not a state, east-bound travelers from Prescott to Santa Fe, New Mexico, rode buckboards. They brought their own food, including hardtack, because there were no places to eat on the 500-mile seven-day trip.



boomers who delight in sixshooters, fine horses, saddles and fast women" is what a Flagstaff newspaper editor called the cowboys of 1883. Cowboys herded cattle from their ranches to the town and put them on trains bound for market.

1891 was the year the University of Arizona opened at Tucson. It was a very small operation to begin, with only 36 students and six professors.

A tall tale about an ancient lost city at Arizona's Grand Canyon was told by a man named G.E. Kincaid in 1909. His story was repeated newspapers magazines all over the country. He claimed he'd entered the city, large enough to hold 50,000 people, through a cave high on a Grand Canyon cliff. He said he'd found mummies. copper tools, and writing he thought came from Egypt or Tibet. He failed to give directions to the city. It's possible Kincaid never existed and that his wild story was fabricated as a joke by someone unknown.

Ellsworth and Emory Kolb were two brothers from Pennsylvania who were professional photographers. They took the first motion pictures of the Grand Canyon in 1911 and worked out of a studio on the canyon's south rim. Their studio building still exists.

After 49 years as a federal territory, Arizona was admitted to the Union as a state in 1912. The new state's official flower was the white blossom of a giant cactus which grows on the Sonoran Desert.



been popular at the rendezvous and also to have caught the attention of a French-Canadian trapper, Joseph Chouinard. When Singing Grass chose Carson over Chouinard, the rejected suitor became belligerent. Chouinard is reported to have thrown a fit, disrupting the camp to the point where Carson could no longer tolerate the situation. Words were exchanged, and Carson and Chouinard charged each other on horses while brandishing their weapons. Using a pistol, Carson blew off Chouinard's thumb. His opponent barely missed killing Carson with his rifle shot; it grazed below his left ear and scorched his eye and hair. Carson said that the fact that Chouinard's horse shied probably saved him, as Chouinard was a splendid shot. The duel with Chouinard is said to have made Carson famous among the mountain men, but was also considered uncharacteristic of him.

Carson considered his years as a trapper to be "the happiest days of my life." He was evidently unusual among

and temperate lifestyle. "Clean as a hound's tooth," according to one acquaintance, and a man whose "word was as sure as the sun comin' up," he was noted for an unassuming manner and implacable courage. Accompanied by

Singing Grass, he worked with the Hudson's Bay Company, as well as the renowned frontiersman Jim Bridger, trapping beaver along the Yellowstone, Powder, and Big Horn rivers. They trapped throughout what is now Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, Idaho, and Montana. Carson's first child, a daughter named Adeline, was born in 1837. (See Western Hero on Page 11)

trappers, for his self-restraint Singing Grass gave birth to a second daughter, but developed a fever shortly after the birth, and died sometime between 1838-40.

> At this time, the nation was undergoing a severe depression. The fur industry was undermined by changing fashion styles: a new demand for silk hats replaced the demand for beaver fur. Also, the trapping industry had devastated the beaver population. This combination of facts ended the need for trappers. Carson said, "Beaver was getting scarce, it became necessary to try our hand at something else."

> He attended the last mountain man rendezvous in the summer of 1840 and moved on to Bent's Fort, finding employment as a hunter. Carson married a Cheyenne woman, "Making-Our-Road", in 1841. She left him only a short time later to follow her tribe's migration.

> By 1842 Carson met and became engaged to the daughter of a prominent Taos family: Josefa Jaramillo. After receiving instruction from Padre Antonio Josi Martynez. he was baptized into the Catholic Church in 1842. At

since familiarly known amongst the miners and prospectors of the region, as "nugget silver," to Mr. Mason,

without but telling him exactly where he had found it. Mr. Mason supposed that he would go back to the place, and, no doubt, expected to go with him and participate in the benefits of the discovery, but


one day Sullivan suddenly disappeared and was not heard of for years after. He was supposed to have been killed by the Apaches, or to have perished on the desert, in the attempt, perhaps, to return to the place where he had found the rich silver ore.

In the year 1875 Mr. Mason and one of his neighbors, Benjamin W. Regan, formed a party of five, consisting of themselves, William H. Long, Isaac Copeland, and another to visit the Globe District, taking a train of animals to bring out some of the ore. On their way back, March 21st, 1875, they were attacked by Apaches and one of their party was killed. His body was taken to Camp Supply, at the summit of the Stoneman Grade, and was buried by his companions in one of the old stone baking ovens used for baking bread by Stoneman's soldiers. When the survivors reached the foot of the grade, near to the water and camp ground, Copeland was sent to break off some of the croppings from projecting rocks at one side of the trail, and bring them into camp two miles below. He went to the place indicated, and soon after came hurrying into camp, shouting: "I've struck it." The excited and hopeful prospectors gathered around

> Sullivan's discovery was no longer his secret.

> Τ h e ownership of the location of the Silver King claim was then equally divided between the four survivors of the party of five, each holding one-fourth. The

mine was worked continuously for many years, and was one of the greatest producers in the Territory. Its ore was milled about ten or twelve

125 Years Ago in the Old West

June 1, 1888

"Politics" is the unofficial reason given for the deaths of Pete Gabriele and Joe Phy at a Florence, Arizona, watering hole; they got into an argument on the topic and killed each other.

June 5, 1888

The Democratic National Convention convenes in St. Louis, where it will nominate President Grover Cleveland for another term as president, and Allen G. Thurman of Ohio for vice president.

June 6, 1888

Wichita, Kansas, celebrates its 18th birthday with a fivemile-long parade.

June 7, 1888

Cochise County, Arizona, sheriff John Slaughter, his deputy, Burt Alvord, and two Mexicans track a gang of jaw without any perceptible robbers into the Whetstone Mountains. Slaughter and company appear at the bandit's camp at dawn, order the sleepers to surrender, and then open fire. When the robber Guadalupe Robles June 24, 1888 leaps to his feet, Slaughter kills him with one shot. Another bandit escapes, despite Slaughter's orders to Alvord: "Burt, there is another son-ofa-bitch, shoot him!"

June 13, 1888

Dr. John Sullivan, a Tombstone dentist, is reported to be the inventor of the "Dental Electric Vibrator,"

battery-operated forceps that, according to the Tombstone Epitaph, cause "the tooth to spring from the effort on the part of the dentist, and without causing the patient any greater pain than would be caused by the prick of a pin."

Kingman, Arizona, the seat of Mohave County, is totally destroyed by fire.

June 28, 1888

Robert Louis Stevenson, 38, has his 95-foot yacht Casco towed out of San Francisco Bay and past the Golden Gate, to begin a round-theworld trip that will end with his death in Samoa in 1894.

present Wallace, Kansas. They met no resistance and arrived on the evening of September 5. Five days later, a band of Chevennes killed three teamsters and stole

hours, only to find the tracks of 30 ponies leading north toward the Republican River. For two weeks he followed the Indian party, which, the trail showed, had become larger.

Late in the afternoon of

September 16, Forsyth came to Arikaree the River in eastern Colorado, miles southeast of present Wray. Rations were low and the men and horses were tired. At the bottom of a grassy valley, a sandbar 40 yards

wide and 150 yards long rose from a nearly dry riverbed.

That night, while his men slept near the river, Forsyth was unable to rest. His worst fears had come true: his presence was well known to the Indians. For three days, a force of 4,000 Cheyennes, Arapahos, and Sioux, including 1,500 warriors, had been aware of his every move.

At dawn a group of young braves, trying to their elders, impress unintentionally saved the volunteers from being wiped out in their sleep. Whooping and shooting, the youths tried





identities of the five men from area ranchers and began to track them down one by one.

Daniels found one of the killers in Deming, New Mexico, and arrested him. He then learned from a Mexican informant that the gang leader. Big Dan Dowd, had fled south of the border to a hideout at Sabinal, Chihuahua. Disguising himself as an ore buyer, Daniels tricked Dowd into a meeting and took him prisoner. A few weeks later, Daniels returned to Mexico and arrested another of the outlaws. Other law officers

apprehended the remaining two companions were riding two members of the gang. A Tombstone, Arizona, jury quickly convicted all five men and sentenced them to be hanged simultaneously. As the noose was fitted around his neck on the five-man gallows, Big Dan reportedly muttered, "This is a regular killing machine."

The next year, Daniels ran for sheriff but lost. He found a new position as an inspector of customs that required him to travel all around the vast and often isolated Arizona countryside, where various bands of hostile Apache Indians were a serious danger. Early on the morning of June 10, 1885, Daniels and up a narrow canyon trail in the Mule Mountains east of Bisbee. Daniels, who was in the lead, rode into an Apache ambush. The first bullets killed his horse, and the animal collapsed, pinning Daniels to the ground. Trapped, Daniels used his rifle to defend himself as best he could, but the Apache quickly overwhelmed him and cut his throat.

His two companions escaped with their lives and returned the next day with a posse. They found Daniels' badly mutilated corpse, but were unable to track the Apache Indians murdered him.

rock. The man was evidently in need of help, and soon went to the office of the company and announced himself as Sullivan, the old soldier, the original discoverer of the vein. and humbly asked for work. Although long before he had been given up as dead, and very few of his old acquaintances survived, he was identified beyond a doubt, and was immediately taken into the company's service by the day.

His story was briefly told as follows: On leaving Mason's ranch he crossed the wide deserts to the westward as far as the great Colorado river, and beyond it into California. Being penniless he had sustained himself by working as a farm hand in California. Always hoping to obtain sufficient means to return to Arizona and secure the benefits of his discovery, he had labored on year after year, looking vaguely forward, and keeping the secret of the locality to himself, until one day he heard of the discovery of the rich deposit of silver by Mason and others. He was convinced that the place had

lost his chance of making the location for himself."

The neighborhood of Florence was, for a long time, the scene of Apache troubles until a decisive issue was made in the early seventies, in which their power was forever broken in that region. General Stoneman was stationed, with several companies of United States soldiers, at Picket Post, the present site of the Silver King Mills, thirty miles north Florence, in the Superstition Mountains. The post was in a valley, on Queen's Creek, easily overlooked from a high ledge of the mountains known as Tordillo Peak, and all of Stoneman's movements were noted in the inception. On top of the mountain was a rancheria of Apaches. These occasionally poured down some unknown pathway upon the settlers along the Gila Valley, stealing, burning, and killing, and when pressed by troops, would vanish in the canyons. The location of the village was suspected, from a solitary Indian now and then seen perched upon these





peaks, watching proceedings at the post, from which his station was inaccessible. All attempts by Stoneman to get at them were fruitless. At length, emboldened by their successes, they raided a ranch near Florence, and drove away a band of cattle. The Florentines armed and followed, till, after several days of patient pursuit, they found the trail that led to the rancheria. The Indians, doubtless feeling secure in this fastness, neglected to post videttes, and thus the Florentines were enabled to steal upon them by night, and at daybreak attacked the rancheria, which was

back from the brow of the bluff overlooking Pickett Post. The Indians seeing they were surrounded, fired a few shots, then threw down their guns, and went to meet the approaching Florentines. with hands raised in token of surrender; but the latter seeing their advantage, and them was cruelty to the defenseless families on the fight which Captain Walker, Gila, determined to make the in command of a company of most of the situation and continued firing upon them. When about two-thirds had fallen, seeing no chance for quarter, the remainder ran to the bluff, where their videttes had been so long stationed to watch Stoneman, and threw themselves over, striking the

to stampede the troops' horses, but only succeeded in doing so with a half dozen. Forsyth's men awoke to the battle cries of 600 attackers. "My God," gasped Chief Scout Sharp Grover, "look at the Indians!" Forsyth thought, "The ground seemed to grow

The men were ordered to the island, where they dug trenches in the sandy earth. Bullets and arrows came from three directions. By 9:00 a.m., every army horse and mule was dead; their bodies would provide a certain amount of cover, but now there was no means of escape.

300 mounted warriors, riding 60 abreast in five ranks, tried to ride the volunteers down. At the last instant, Forsyth commanded his men to fire their Spencer seven-shot rifles. The repeating weapons broke the charge, as the Indians galloped around but not over the island. Indian women and children watched in horror from a nearby hill.

In the encounter, Forsyth was struck by bullets in both legs. When the great Cheyenne warrior Roman Nose stood to taunt his adversaries, Forsyth marveled, "Save for a crimson silk sash knotted around his waist, and the moccasins on his feet, he was perfectly naked." "He drew his body up to its full height and shook his At 9:30, an estimated clenched fist defiantly at us,'

recalled Forsyth. "He. . .gave tongue to a war cry that I have never yet heard equaled."

Again the rifles broke a charge of hundreds. As the riders swept by on either side of the island, one scout stood up and blasted Roman Nose with a .52 caliber slug in the back at close range. By the end of the day, Roman Nose was dead and the attackers had been driven back. Forsyth's men rejoiced in the late afternoon rain.

But the day had not been without toll. Lieutenant Beecher had been killed, as had army surgeon Dr. John Mooers, who was shot in the head while tending to Beecher. Forsyth had been shot again, grazed in the head. That night, Jack Stillwell and Pierre Trudeau volunteered to try to make it to Fort Wallace, 85 miles to the southeast.

Action on the "island of death" lasted for eight days. The Indians still charged, though their organization deteriorated seriously after the death of Roman Nose. The volunteers' provisions ran out quickly-they were forced to

34, Carson married his third wife, 14-year-old Josefa, on February 6, 1843.

In 1842, while returning to Missouri to visit his family, Carson happened to meet John C. Fremont, who soon hired him as a guide. Over the next several years, Carson helped guide Fremont Oregon California, and through much of the Central Rocky Mountains and the Great Basin. His service with Fremont, celebrated in Fremont's widely read reports of his expeditions, quickly made Kit Carson a national hero, presented in popular fiction as a rugged mountain man capable of superhuman feats.

Carson's notoriety grew as his name became associated with several key events in the

United States' westward expansion. He was still serving as Fremont's guide when Fremont joined California's short-lived Bear-Flag rebellion

1846, and it was Carson who led the forces of U.S. General Stephen Kearney from New Mexico into California when a California band led by

> returned to New Mexico with his wife Maria Josepha and their children and took up ranching. By 1853, he and his partner were able to drive a large flock of sheep to California, where gold rush prices paid them a handsome profit. This same year Carson was appointed federal Indian agent for Northern New Mexico. Under this appointment was largely instrumental in bringing about several treaties between the United States and the Indians. He was an instinctive judge of character, and, knowing the Indians so thoroughly, his cool judgment and wisdom in dealing with them, even under the most trying circumstances.

By the late 1780s. Izmailov had become one of a small number of Russian captains with extensive experience sailing the Alaskan Coast. Izmailov initially reached several islands off the coast where he erected large wooden crosses proclaiming the territory to be the property of Russia. He then proceeded eastward down the Alaskan coastline, finally

putting into shore at Yakutat

Bay.

Yakutat Izmailov immediately began a peaceful and successful program of fur trading with the Tlingit Indians. He presented the Tlingit Chief Ilkhak with a portrait of Czar Paul, presumably suggesting that the far-off monarch should be viewed as the Tlingit's new ruler. In a rather ineffective attempt to further solidify the Russian claim, Izmailov had two large copper plates marking "the extent of Russia's domain" buried nearby. More a symbolic

Colorado's Mount of the Holy Cross

tories had abounded for years that a natural cross of snow lay hidden high in the rugged mountains of Colorado. Many claimed to have seen the cross, but searchers were unable to find August 1873, In photographer William Henry Jackson set out to prove its existence by taking a picture of it. Jackson was an experienced wilderness photographer who had accompanied wagon trains to California in 1866 and was employed as expedition photographer on Ferdinand Hayden's survey of the Yellowstone region in 1871. Published in popular masscirculation magazines like Harper's Weekly, his images became immensely popular and showed Americans a rugged western wilderness that most would never see firsthand.

Jackson had heard rumors of the extraordinary cross of snow that occasionally appeared on the face of a high mountain peak and he led a small party to the supposed site in north central Colorado in the summer of 1873. Jackson found the cross, though there was nothing miraculous about its cause.



After thousands of years of erosion, two deep ravines had formed in the steep rocky face of a mountain peak. Intersecting at a 90-degree angle, the ravines sheltered the winter snow from the sun well after the rest of the mountain snow had melted away. For a brief time, a nearly perfect cross of snow appeared on the rock face, though it often melted away later in the summer.

Mount of the Holy Cross is the northernmost 14,000foot mountain in the Sawatch Range, part of the Rocky Mountains in Colorado. It is located in the Holy Cross Wilderness near the ghost town of Holy Cross City and in Eagle County. Under USDA Forest Service administration, the mountain was proclaimed "Holy Cross National Monument" by Herbert Hoover on May 11, 1929. The monument was transferred to the National Park Service in 1933. In 1950. it was returned to the Forest Service and lost its National status-the

poem by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, (The Cross of Snow) It is still much photographed, but it is not as well known today as it was in the past.

Monument number of visitors to the mountain and the nearby "Pilgrim's Hut" had waned, and the expense of full-time staff could not be justified. The mountain has long been the subject of painters, photographers and even a



eat horseflesh and wild plums for the better part of a week.

After a series of dramatic close calls. Stillwell and Trudeau made it back to Fort Wallace. A hundred black soldiers, Troop H of the 10th U.S. Cavalry, were sent to rescue Forsyth's command. They arrived on September 26. By then, most of the Indians had moved on, leaving behind a small force to try to starve out the defenders. The Indians quickly dispersed at the sound of the approaching bugle.

Ten men had died on the island

and another 20 had been seriously wounded. Forsyth refused to have his infected leg amputated, but he eventually made a full recovery. Indian casualties were difficult to determine: Forsyth said 35 were killed, whereas another soldier counted at least 50; perhaps as many as 200 were wounded.

Technology was the true winner at the Battle of Beecher's Island. With repeating rifles and Colt pistols, a small band of frontiersmen had beaten what a few years earlier would have been considered insurmountable odds. In one of the West's most hellish encounters, the conflict on the Plains had taken on newer, deadlier dimensions.

gesture than an actual assertion of ownership, they were designed to prove Russia had been the first western nation to arrive in the area. True Russian control over the region was not established until fur trading posts and settlements were constructed over the next few decades.

After further exploring the Alaskan coast, Izmailov eventually returned to his homeport of Okhotsk, where he is thought to have died around 1796. Although the Russians continued to consolidate their hold on Alaska during the first half of the 19th century, the claim had become tenuous and expensive to maintain by the 1860s. In 1867, Russia sold the region of Alaska to the United States for \$7 million.




